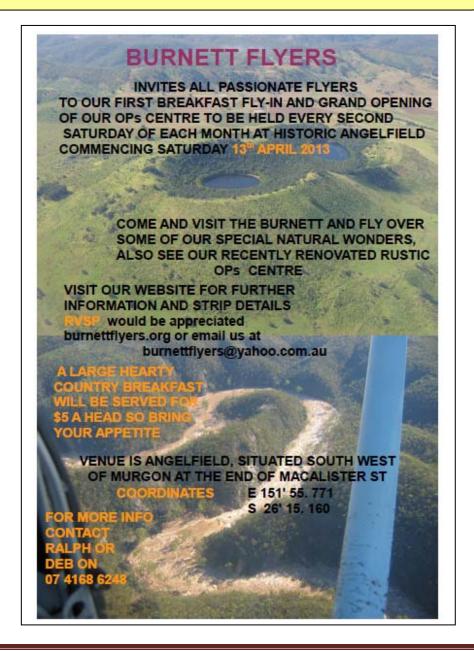
SUBJECT - WORKING B.

Oh to fly a Dragonfly (Details thanks to Roger Bishop)

Unusual aeroplanes, or aeroplanes with unusual design applications, have long intrigued me and Colin Moyes' Dragonfly C fits this category admirably.

Glider tugs are supposed to be little aeroplane with big motors that roar off down the runway with one or more, usually white birds attached on long strings behind them. But how about a glider tug that has a never exceed speed slower than many gliders fly. Yes, that's the depiction of the Dragonfly C.

First flown in 1990, there are now around 100 flying here and in 11 other countries around the world. A special purpose aeroplane, these little beauties that look like a Drifter on a diet, have become the most sought after hang glider tugs in the world. They are also popular for stock control on sheep and cattle stations as their STOL performance is so startling, and they are much cheaper to own and operate than a helicopter. They are reportedly even cheaper to operate than a gyrocopter.

The Dragonfly C is a two seat tandem ultralight. It is constructed of bolted aluminium with its seats mounted on a fuselage boom tube that runs from the front rudder pedals to the tail. The tail wheel configured landing gear consists of two main wheels on steel U/C legs and axles with the steel axles having sufficient flex to handle operational shock loading during taxiing and landing. The steerable tail wheel is cable linked to the rudder pedals.

Arranged in a pusher configuration behind the wing trailing edge, the most common power plant is the tried and trusty ROTAX 582. The engine's liquid-cooling allows fast descents while towing, without subjecting the engine cylinders to shock-cooling. Other power plants include the ROTAX 80 HP 912 ULS and the BMW 1100S engine.



The main plane is conventional and is braced with V-struts and jury struts and flying wires. The fabric covered wing and tail surfaces are encased in pre-sewn Dacron. A unique feature is the extended rudder post, which is supported by steel cables from the wings and used as a tow attachment point. The aircraft is equipped with dual controls for pilot training and the rear seat is removable when not needed. The aircraft takes about 200 hours to assemble from the kit.

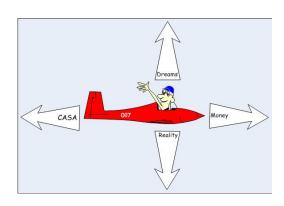
